Sexual Assault Awareness Month


Sexual assault can take many different forms and be defined in different ways, but one thing remains the same: it's never the victim's fault.

Rape is the only crime in which the victim becomes the accused.
- Freda Adler

- On average, there are 463,634 victims (age 12+) of rape and sexual assault each year.
- Age 12-34 are the highest risk years for rape and sexual assault.
- About 3% of American men or 1 in 33 have experienced an attempted or completed rape in their lifetime.
- 1 out of every 10 rape victims are male.
- 55% of sexual assaults occurred at or near the victim's home, 15% in an open public space.

PREA: Prison Rape Elimination Act

The Montana Department of Corrections takes the safety and security of staff and offenders at its facilities seriously. This includes complying with the Prison Rape Elimination Act signed into law by President Bush on Sept. 4, 2003. This law was enacted to address the detection, prevention, reduction and prosecution of sexual abuse or sexual harassment in all correctional facilities in the nation.

Nationwide, an estimated 80,600 inmates each year experience sexual violence.



PREA: Assures your right to be safe from sexual abuse and sexual harassment

Rights as a Victim of Sexual Abuse

- The right to be treated with dignity and respect.
- The right to report privately, safely, and in different ways.
- The right to have an advocate or support person available for a forensic medical exam
- The right to get help from trained medical and mental health care professionals.
- The right to have an advocate or liaison with you through the investigation process.

Reporting Suspected Sexual Abuse or Sexual Harassment

Anyone who suspects or has knowledge of any sexual harassment, sexual abuse or sexual misconduct in any juvenile or adult correctional facility should report it to a staff member, volunteer, supervisor, administrator, human resources official or the PREA unit.

Last Chance Gulch PO Box 201301 Helena, MT 59620- 1301 CORPREAReporting@mt.gov Inmates may file grievances, tell their case manager or unit manager, or speak with a correctional officer or any staff member with whom they feel comfortable and trust. Anyone who receives a report of sexual abuse or sexual harassment in any confinement setting must send it up the chain of command for investigation and disposition.


