FPB-2002; PPB-3003; CG-0001	<b>208 Transfer</b>	<b>208 Transfer</b> – Transfer of a youth's supervisory responsibility to District Court after a juvenile disposition, pursuant to 41-5-208, MCA.	1/28/2026
PPB-3006	<b>Absconder (Interstate)</b>	<b>Absconder (Interstate)</b> – An offender who is absent from the offender's approved place of residence and employment and fails to comply with reporting requirements.	1/28/2026
PPB-3009; CG-0002	<b>Absconding</b>	<b>Absconding</b> – When an offender deliberately makes the offender's whereabouts unknown to a Probation and Parole Officer or fails to report for the purposes of avoiding supervision, and reasonable efforts by the Probation and Parole Officer to locate the offender have been unsuccessful.	1/28/2026
HSG-1005	<b>Access to Care</b>	<b>Access to Care</b> – A system in which an offender is seen by a clinician, given a professional clinical judgment, and receives care that is indicated, all within a timely manner.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1013	<b>Activities of Daily Living</b>	<b>Activities of Daily Living</b> – Activities usually performed in the course of a normal day in a person's life, such as ambulation, bathing, dressing, feeding, and toileting.	1/28/2026
MSP-5911	<b>Acutely Suicidal (Active)</b>	<b>Acutely Suicidal (Active)</b> – Inmates who engage in self-injurious behavior or threaten suicide and have a specific plan for carrying it out and are placed on constant observation to ensure safety.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1016; FPB-2014	<b>Adjunct Programming</b>	<b>Adjunct Programming</b> – Programming that is structured, positive, and a productive use of an offender's time. This programming is not considered essential for release decision-making or may be voluntary in nature versus driven by assessment.	1/28/2026
CG-0009; DOCP-1020; MWPP-6017; PHCF-7503	<b>Administrative Investigation</b>	<b>Administrative Investigation</b> – Any agency investigation that is not conducted for the purpose of law enforcement or criminal prosecution.	1/28/2026
LANG-9003	<b>Administrative Segregation</b>	<b>Administrative Segregation</b> – A non-punitive housing status for offenders whose continued presence in the general population may pose a serious threat to life, property, self, staff, other offenders, or to the facility's security or orderly operation.	1/28/2026
FPB-2018	<b>Administrative Transfer</b>	<b>Administrative Transfer</b> – A management decision whereby an offender is moved from one correctional facility to another of equal or greater level of custody for non-disciplinary or behavioral reasons. CORG-9003	<b>Administrator</b>	<b>Administrator</b> – The official, regardless of local title (division chief executive officer, bureau chief, warden, superintendent), ultimately responsible for the division, facility, or program operation and management.	1/28/2026
CG-0012; DOCP-1027; MSP-5019	<b>Admission / Discharge Report (ADR)</b>	<b>Admission / Discharge Report (ADR)</b> – The mandatory reporting form completed by staff when offenders move from one program location to another.	1/28/2026
MSP-5023	<b>Advance Directive</b>	<b>Advance Directive</b> – Expression of the patient's wishes as to how future care should be delivered or declined, including decisions that must be made when the patient is not capable of expressing those wishes. These directives are useful for terminally ill patients but can be used by any inmate regardless of health status.	1/28/2026
MSP-5028	<b>Aggregate Census Check</b>	<b>Aggregate Census Check</b> – A scheduled check to verify that inmates are in the proper location during designated periods between official counts in which the area supervisor calls the housing unit(s) and gives a verbal report of the number of inmates counted.	1/28/2026
LANG-9007	<b>Agreement</b>	<b>Agreement</b> – A disciplinary hearing procedure that provides an inmate the opportunity to plead guilty to a major or minor infraction, as written, accept an offered sanction, and waive the right to a hearing on that incident.	1/28/2026
MSP-5030	<b>Aids to Reduce Effects of Impairment</b>	<b>Aids to Reduce Effects of Impairment</b> – Any device or needed accommodation that aids in daily functioning, for example, eyeglasses, hearing aids, canes, crutches, sleep apnea machines, and wheelchairs.	1/28/2026
MSP-5035	<b>Airborne Precautions</b>	<b>Airborne Precautions</b> – A category of Transmission-Based Precautions that CDC and Health Care Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee (HICPAC) may recommend when Standard Precautions alone are not sufficient to prevent the transmission of disease. When airborne precautions are required, patients should be placed in airborne infection isolation rooms and health care personnel sharing patients' airspaces should wear respirators.	1/28/2026
CG-0022; DOCP-1041; PPB-3018	<b>Appropriate Good Time Credit</b>	<b>Appropriate Good Time Credit</b> – The amount of good time appropriate under the policy and state law in effect at the time the offender earned the credit.	1/28/2026
CG-0023; DOCP-1042	<b>Armed Assignment</b>	<b>Armed Assignment</b> – Assignments involving personnel whose essential functions and responsibilities include carrying and deploying a firearm, for example, offender transport officers, duty officers, specialized teams, and probation and parole officers.	1/28/2026
MSP-5743; MSP-5041	<b>Armorer</b>	<b>Armorer</b> – A designated staff member who maintains the operation of the armory and makes authorized repairs to Department firearms within the parameters of their current certification.	1/28/2026

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MSP-5744	<b>Armory</b>	<b>Armory</b> – A specific location that is designed to provide secure storage for firearms, ammunition, and related equipment.	1/28/2026
CG-0026; DOCP-1044	<b>Assaultive Conduct</b>	<b>Assaultive Conduct</b> – Conduct in which an offender attacks another person, for example, throws offensive items such as bodily substances or fluids; constantly barrages another with threats or verbal assaults; and/or physically attacks another person with or without a weapon.	1/28/2026
CORG-9007	<b>Assessment / Sanction Center</b>	<b>Assessment / Sanction Center</b> – A facility/program that evaluates the needs of offenders for placement.	1/28/2026
MSP-5046	<b>Atypical</b>	<b>Atypical</b> – Security Threat Groups (STG), predatory, special needs, and vulnerable inmates designated by classification.	1/28/2026
MSP-5047	<b>Atypical Inmate</b>	<b>Atypical Inmate</b> – Predatory and vulnerable inmates designated by classification.	1/28/2026
CG-0031; DOCP-1053	<b>Basic Education</b>	<b>Basic Education</b> – Instruction in basic skills, such as reading, writing, arithmetic, and other skills required to function in society, which may include any subject normally offered in the basic curricula of an accredited elementary or secondary school in the state.	1/28/2026
CG-0033; DOCP-1056	<b>Behavior Management Plan (BMP)</b>	<b>Behavior Management Plan (BMP)</b> – A standardized plan on which facility staff place an offender to end the dangerous and/or assaultive conduct. The BMP will be in effect for six months, during which time the unit management team, in conjunction with a mental health professional, may activate the plan when the offender engages in the conduct the plan seeks to end.	1/28/2026
PPB-3036	<b>Behavior Requiring Retaking (Interstate)</b>	<b>Behavior Requiring Retaking (Interstate)</b> – An act or pattern of non-compliance with conditions of supervision that could not be successfully addressed through the use of documented corrective action or graduated responses and could result in a request for revocation of supervision in the receiving state.	1/28/2026
MSP-5749	<b>Biological</b>	<b>Biological</b> – Any substance involving a disease organism, such as smallpox, botulinum toxin, and Ricin.	1/28/2026
CG-0034; DOCP-1058	<b>Biological Sample</b>	<b>Biological Sample</b> – The removal of cheek cells by using a buccal swab of a type authorized by the Department of Justice or a vial or other container of blood.	1/28/2026

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HSB-9005	<b>Bloodborne Pathogens</b>	<b>Bloodborne Pathogens</b> – Microorganisms such as viruses or bacteria that are carried in blood and can cause disease in people. There are many different bloodborne pathogens, including malaria, syphilis, and brucellosis, and most notably Hepatitis B (HBV), Hepatitis C (HCV) and the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV).	1/28/2026
CORG-C-9257	<b>Body Cavity Search</b>	<b>Body Cavity Search</b> – A manual or instrument inspection of an offender's oral, anal, or vaginal body cavities.	1/28/2026
MSP-5750	<b>Bomb</b>	<b>Bomb</b> – An explosive device filled with chemicals, pyrotechnics, and/or inner filler, that usually has a stabilizer and initiator, and that is designed to create bodily harm or destruction.	1/28/2026
CG-0040; DOCP-1065	<b>Buccal Swab</b>	<b>Buccal Swab</b> – The removal of cheek cells by means of a sterile swab.	1/28/2026
MSP-5058	<b>Call Monitoring</b>	<b>Call Monitoring</b> – Live, electronic interception of a telephone call by an authorized staff member listening to a verbal conversation between an inmate and another party.	1/28/2026
MSP-5059	<b>Call Recording</b>	<b>Call Recording</b> – Electronic interception and storage of sounds and conversations between an inmate and another party. The recording may be archived, reviewed, and investigated by authorized staff.	1/28/2026
MSP-5060	<b>Call-Out / Hold-In List</b>	<b>Call-Out / Hold-In List</b> – A daily schedule authorizing staff to hold an inmate in the unit pending movement to an appointment/activity as listed.	1/28/2026
MSPG-5048	<b>Canteen / Commissary</b>	<b>Canteen / Commissary</b> – An on-site outlet where offenders can make small purchases of personal needs items, snack foods, and other assorted items as approved by the facility.	1/28/2026
CG-0044; DOCP-1066	<b>Canteen Revenues</b>	<b>Canteen Revenues</b> – Net profits generated from the sale of canteen items at Department and contract facilities.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1068	<b>Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation</b>	<b>Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation</b> – A medical procedure involving repeated compression of a patient's chest, performed in an attempt to restore the blood circulation and breathing of a person who has suffered cardiac arrest.	1/28/2026
CG-0049	<b>Case Management</b>	<b>Case Management</b> – The act of developing and managing an offender's treatment plan and monitoring progress and compliance.	1/28/2026

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PPB-3051	<b>Case Management Response</b>	<b>Case Management Response</b> – An informal action in response to an offender's behavior in which a Probation and Parole Officer may apply incentives or interventions based on the behavior. <i>Incentive</i> is a response that recognizes and/or rewards desired and targeted offender behavior. <i>Intervention</i> is a response that addresses offender violations of conditions of supervision or rules of a Probation and Parole program/facility without Hearings Officer involvement, unless the offender refuses to agree with the given intervention.	1/28/2026
FPB-2664	<b>Case Plan</b>	<b>Case Plan</b> – An evolving document that outlines case management strategies designed to engage the offender, target individual risks and needs, and track progress as the offender transitions through the correctional system.	1/28/2026
PPB-3054	<b>Case Planning</b>	<b>Case Planning</b> – The process of developing an individualized plan for offenders designed to identify and target the offender's identified dynamic risk factors based upon the offender's assessment.	1/28/2026
CG-0052	<b>Cell / Cube / Block Confinement / Restriction</b>	<b>Cell / Cube / Block Confinement / Restriction</b> – A disciplinary sanction that confines an inmate to a designated area except for attendance at work, school assignment, scheduled medical appointment, treatment appointments, visits, religious activities, and meals. The inmate will be allowed emergency phone calls and scheduled legal calls.	1/28/2026
MSP-5070	<b>Cell Search</b>	<b>Cell Search</b> – A complete search of an inmate housing assigned area and its contents, including inmate(s) if they are present at the time.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1070; MSP-5071; MWPP-6083	<b>Census Check</b>	<b>Census Check</b> – A count taken in housing units or other locations during periods between official counts to determine if inmates are in their assigned areas.	1/28/2026
MSP-5075	<b>Check Point</b>	<b>Check Point</b> – The location designated as the official initial entry and exit point to MSP/MCE property.	1/28/2026
LANG-9011	<b>Chemical Agent</b>	<b>Chemical Agent</b> – An irritant such as orthochlorobenzalmalononitrile (CS), commonly known as tear gas, that may cause a burning sensation and tearing of the eyes and a burning irritation of the mucous membranes of the nose, mouth, and throat resulting in profuse coughing, nasal mucus discharge, disorientation, and difficulty breathing.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1073	<b>Chemical Treatment</b>	<b>Chemical Treatment</b> – Medically safe medroxyprogesterone acetate treatment or its chemical equivalent or other medically safe drug treatment that reduces sexual fantasies, sex drive, or both, as provided in 45-5-512, MCA.	1/28/2026

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DOCP-1082	<b>Children with a Serious Emotional Disturbance</b>	<b>Children with a Serious Emotional Disturbance</b> – Persons from birth up to age 18, who currently or at any time during the past year, have had a diagnosable mental, behavioral, or emotional disorder of sufficient duration to meet diagnostic criteria specified within the most recent Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM), that has resulted in functional impairment that substantially interferes with or limits the child's role or functioning in family, school, or community activities.	1/28/2026
CG-0070	<b>Classification</b>	<b>Classification</b> – An objective process conducted upon entry into jail or prison that assesses a detainee or inmate's risks of engaging in harmful behavior or of being harmed while incarcerated, determining the type of housing and program access.	1/28/2026
LANG-9015	<b>Classification Review Committee (CRC)</b>	<b>Classification Review Committee (CRC)</b> – An MSP committee consisting of the Restrictive Housing Program Compliance Manager, Associate Warden of Custody or designee, Qualified Mental Health Professional (QMHP), Qualified Health Care Professional (QHCP), Restrictive Housing Unit Lieutenant/Manager, Secure Adjustment Unit Lieutenant/Manager, High Side and Low Side Captains or designees, and a staff member from Classification.	1/28/2026
CG-0071; DOCP-1088	<b>Classification System</b>	<b>Classification System</b> – A method that uses an objective scoring system to appropriately recommend offender custody levels based on verifiable case information, facility security levels, degree of required supervision, and available program resources.	1/28/2026
MWPP-6121; MWPP-6123	<b>Clear Conduct</b>	<b>Clear Conduct</b> – No major infraction convictions within a specified amount of time.	1/28/2026
HSG-1012	<b>Clinical Mortality Review</b>	<b>Clinical Mortality Review</b> – An assessment of the clinical care provided and the circumstances leading up to a death. Its purpose is to identify areas of patient care and/or system policies and procedures that can be improved.	1/28/2026
CORG-9009	<b>Clinical Restraints</b>	<b>Clinical Restraints</b> – A therapeutic intervention initiated by qualified medical or mental health staff to use devices designed to safely limit an inmate's mobility.	1/28/2026
CG-0074; DOCP-1098	<b>Close Associate</b>	<b>Close Associate</b> – Persons, other than immediate family members, who may be considered friends or business partners through known associations.	1/28/2026

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MSP-5901	<b>Close Watch</b>	<b>Close Watch</b> – This watch level is a step-down from Constant Watch and is designed for potentially or inactively suicidal inmates who express suicidal ideation without a specific threat or plan and/or have recently demonstrated self-injurious behaviors. Inmates who deny suicidal ideation or do not threaten suicide but demonstrate other concerning behavior indicating the potential for self-injury should be placed on this watch level. Inmates on this level are placed in a Watch Cell with appropriately safe belongings and are observed in-person by a staff person at irregular intervals no less frequent than 15 minutes apart.	1/28/2026
CORG-C-9013	<b>Clothed Body Search</b>	<b>Clothed Body Search</b> – A search of an individual during which the individual is not required to remove their clothing. Also referred as ‘Frisk’ or ‘Pat Down’ Search.	1/28/2026
CG-0076	<b>Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT)</b>	<b>Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT)</b> – A problem-focused approach designed to help people identify and change the dysfunctional beliefs, thoughts, and patterns of behavior that contribute to their problems.	1/28/2026
MSP-5913	<b>Columbia Suicide-Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS)</b>	<b>Columbia Suicide-Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS)</b> – Developed by Columbia University, the University of Pennsylvania, and the University of Pittsburgh, the C-SSRS supports suicide risk assessment through a series of simple, plain-language questions. The answers help the facility staff to identify whether an offender is at risk for suicide, assess the severity and immediacy of that risk, and gauge the level of support an offender needs.	1/28/2026
CG-0078	<b>Commit or Commitment Status (Legal Status)</b>	<b>Commit or Commitment Status (Legal Status)</b> – A term of incarceration, as provided in Title 45 for the offense, at a county detention center or at a state prison to be designated by the Department: State Prison Commit, MSP Commit, MWP Commit, DOC Commit, DPPHS Commit, Dual Commitment (DOC/MSP/MWP and DPHHS), Interstate Compact, Deferred, 208 Transfer, DOC Probation.	1/28/2026
MSP-5100	<b>Common Area</b>	<b>Common Area</b> – Any area to which multiple inmates have simultaneous access.	1/28/2026
CORG-C-9017	<b>Communal Articles</b>	<b>Communal Articles</b> – Items deemed necessary by the governing body of a faith group for communal religious activities. Communal articles will be secured in an assigned location in an authorized area.	1/28/2026
PPB-3072	<b>Communicable or Infectious Disease</b>	<b>Communicable or Infectious Disease</b> – A disease that can be transferred from one individual to another by direct or indirect contact.	1/28/2026

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CG-0079	<b>Community Corrections</b>	<b>Community Corrections</b> – A component of the criminal justice system that offers programs and services in the community and/or viable alternatives to incarceration for individuals at various stages of the criminal justice process. Community corrections may include pretrial programs; behavior change strategies; restitution, fines, and fee collection; Probation and Parole supervision; electronic monitoring; community service; day reporting centers; and residential facilities.	1/28/2026
PPB-3075	<b>Community Corrections Facilities and Programs Bureau</b>	<b>Community Corrections Facilities and Programs Bureau</b> – The Bureau oversees the facilities providing assessments and sanctions, prerelease, and treatment services. This Bureau is referenced interchangeably as Programs and Facilities Bureau (PFB) or Facilities and Programs Bureau (FPB) in policies, procedures, and forms.	1/28/2026
CG-0081; FPB-2074; PPB-3078	<b>Community Corrections Facility</b>	<b>Community Corrections Facility</b> – Assessment/sanction centers, prerelease centers, and residential substance use disorder treatment facilities.	1/28/2026
PPB-3081	<b>Community Networking</b>	<b>Community Networking</b> – Actively involving community members in the monitoring, surveillance, and supervision of offenders in their community. These community members may be professionals involved in the treatment/programming of offenders, employers, educators, law enforcement, offender family members, neighbors, mentors, tutors, or other volunteers.	1/28/2026
FPB-2078; PPB-3084	<b>Community Supervision</b>	<b>Community Supervision</b> – Probation, parole, conditional release, or any form of supervision in the community by a Probation and Parole Officer.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1103	<b>Community Work Program</b>	<b>Community Work Program</b> – Work program located in the community for eligible offenders; provided for governmental agencies or not-for-profit organizations pursuant to 53-30-131, MCA.	1/28/2026
CG-0089; DOCP-1106	<b>Community Work Projects</b>	<b>Community Work Projects</b> – Short-term work projects at state-owned or leased properties or in community settings requiring facility supervision.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1110	<b>Competency Based Training</b>	<b>Competency Based Training</b> – Training designed to achieve mastery of a job-related task.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1111	<b>Complainant</b>	<b>Complainant</b> – The person(s) who makes the initial complaint or files a formal charge against a Department employee or offender.	1/28/2026
CORG-9021	<b>Complaint</b>	<b>Complaint</b> – A written allegation regarding a violation of law, policy, or procedure against Department staff and/or contract staff.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1113	<b>Completeness</b>	<b>Completeness</b> – All of each record's fields are completed and contain all pertinent information.	1/28/2026

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CG-0102; PPB-3093	<b>Compliance Violation</b>	<b>Compliance Violation</b> – A violation of the conditions of supervision that is not a non-compliance violation.	1/28/2026
CG-0103	<b>Concurrent Sentence</b>	<b>Concurrent Sentence</b> – Prison terms for two or more convictions to be served simultaneously, rather than one sentence following after the other. As a result, the person's actual time under correctional supervision is equal to their longest sentence.	1/28/2026
CG-0106	<b>Conditional Discharge from Supervision (CDFS) [Correctional Status]</b>	<b>Conditional Discharge from Supervision (CDFS) [Correctional Status]</b> – As defined in 46-23-1020, MCA, 1) a discharge from supervision by the Department for the time remaining on the sentence imposed if the probationer or parolee complies with all the conditions imposed by the District Court or the Board of Pardons and Parole; and 2) a release from the obligation to pay supervision fees imposed as part of a sentence or as terms of parole or probation.	1/28/2026
CG-0105	<b>Conditional Release (CR) [Correctional Status]</b>	<b>Conditional Release (CR) [Correctional Status]</b> – A Correctional Status that applies to DOC commitments placed in a community corrections program and released to community supervision prior to the expiration of their sentence when determined appropriate by the Department. The release to the community of an inmate is under the auspices of the Department and subject to their rules. This release is not a parole release. These inmates will no longer remain eligible for parole consideration during their release. If a Conditional Release inmate violates the conditions of release and is designated to a secure facility, they become eligible for parole when records staff advises that the minimum time has been served on their sentence.	1/28/2026
PPB-3099	<b>Conditional Release Hearing</b>	<b>Conditional Release Hearing</b> – A formal administrative hearing that provides applicable due process requirements to confront violations of conditional release supervision.	1/28/2026
CORGC-9270	<b>Conductive Energy Device</b>	<b>Conductive Energy Device</b> – Less lethal weapon system that uses electrical current. These short bursts of high-voltage current cause neuromuscular incapacitation.	1/28/2026
FPB-2082; PPB-3105	<b>Confidential Criminal Justice Information</b>	<b>Confidential Criminal Justice Information</b> – Criminal investigative information; criminal intelligence information; fingerprints and investigative or intelligence photographs; criminal justice information or records made confidential by law; and any other criminal justice information not clearly defined as public criminal justice information. 44-5-103, MCA.	1/28/2026

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DOCP-1735	<b>Confidential Offender</b>	<b>Confidential Offender</b> – This designation in the offender management system requires that information sharing about an offender is limited due to risk to themselves or others or due to Interstate Compact requirements. The designation may include victims for whom the Department has identified a need for protection, protected witnesses or informants, designated offenders who participated in or are currently participating in an investigation or other activities that might put them at risk, and certain Interstate Compact offenders.	1/28/2026
HSB-9009	<b>Confirmatory Testing</b>	<b>Confirmatory Testing</b> – Refers to a laboratory testing process performed by the Montana Forensic Science Division, State Crime Lab, or a Department-approved private lab to confirm the presence of a drug or drug metabolite within a testing sample.	1/28/2026
CG-0108	<b>Consecutive Sentence</b>	<b>Consecutive Sentence</b> – A sentence that commences after the completion of another sentence. This occurs when at least two terms are to be served one after the other. All sentences are assumed to be consecutive unless ordered otherwise by the court.	1/28/2026
MSP-5905	<b>Constant Watch</b>	<b>Constant Watch</b> – This watch level is designed for actively suicidal inmates who have engaged in self-injurious behavior or threaten suicide with a specific plan. Inmates under Constant Watch must be observed in-person by a staff member at all times. Constant Watch is the default suicide monitoring status until a QMHP is available to assess the inmate. Inmates on this level are placed in a Safety / Observation Cell, which may be in the Infirmary or RHU.	1/28/2026
PPB-3114	<b>Contact Staff</b>	<b>Contact Staff</b> – Staff who have frequent offender contact as a normal job function including, but not limited to, administrators, correctional officers, correctional counselors, investigators, teachers, work supervisors, Probation and Parole officers, mental health and health care providers and staff, and staff working in offices where offenders may be assigned full-time work.	1/28/2026
CORG-C-9025	<b>Contact Visit</b>	<b>Contact Visit</b> – A visit in which the inmate and visitor are permitted limited physical contact.	1/28/2026
DOCP-1124	<b>Continuous Accommodations</b>	<b>Continuous Accommodations</b> – Accommodations that are constant, on a permanent or semi-permanent basis.	1/28/2026
CORG-C-9029	<b>Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI)</b>	<b>Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI)</b> – A continuous and ongoing effort to achieve measurable improvements and outcomes in a program. Programs include but are not limited to the health care system and evidence-based practices.	1/28/2026
